Our Cowichan Year in Review

Wow, when reflecting back on 2018, the amount of work completed by our incredible team of community partners inside and outside of Our Cowichan is astounding. We don't have

photos for everything but here are a few highlights of what is possible in Cowichan when we work together.

(It should be noted that Our Cowichan is **one of <u>many partners</u>** working together and are proud of working in collaboration with others).

Cowichan District Hospital Foundation, Island Health, Cowichan Neighbourhood House, Town of Lake Cowichan, Cowichan Housing Association, Ladysmith Resources Association, Cowichan Basket Society, Schizophrenia Society, Canadian Mental Health Association, CVRD, Arbutus Ridge Ratepayers Association, Discovery Youth and Family Services, Cowichan Tribes, Cowichan Hospice Society, Alzheimer Society of BC, BC Community Response Network, Cowichan Caregivers Support Society, Clements Centre Society, Cowichan United Way, Municipality of North Cowichan, City of Duncan, FNHA, Ministry of Children and Family Development, Lyackson FN, Cowichan Intercultural Society, Social Planning Cowichan, School District 79, Cowichan Seniors Community Foundation, Cowichan Division of Family Practice, Citizens at Large, Halalt FN, RCMP, BC Ambulance, Cowichan Women Against Violence, Salvation Army, Duncan United Church, Ministry of Environment, Medical Health Officer, MP Alistair MacGregor, MLA Sonia Furestenau, Volunteer Cowichan, Phoenix Wellness Centre, Town of Ladysmith, NARSF, Safer Futures Cowichan, and so many more!



<u>January-</u> The Us and Them Film brought over 450 community members together to learn about homelessness and addictions. \$1,977.35 in donations will go to the local Street School to directly support individuals who are living rough on Cowichan Streets.

January also brought together community partners around Housing First for Youth, The Cowichan Housing Coalition, EPIC, Physical Literacy, the Community Action Team and the Our Cowichan Network Meeting. The City of Duncan denies an application for a cold weather women's shelter and efforts to get women housed in

the winter of 2017/2018 is not possible.

<u>February-</u> Housing conversations were ramping up with local governments coming together to learn about the housing needs in Cowichan. Partners Cowichan Housing Association, Social Planning Cowichan, the United Way and many others worked non-stop night and day during this time as the Housing and Homelessness Coalition, Housing First for Youth, Affordable Housing Committee and more were under development. An Opioid dialogue with University Students was held at VIU that was well attended and supported by over a dozen community partners who presented and supported the dialogue.

Our Cowichan supported Cowichan 2050, the establishment of the South Cowichan Seniors Network, Island Health Evaluation, The Aging Well via the senior's speaker's series and the Cowichan Regional Airshed Roundtable!

<u>March</u> Community efforts to address child apprehensions was about to get underway. Pre-planning with community leaders began. The opportunity for our region to access \$100,000.00 in Overdose Prevention funds was announced and meetings to plan the grant application began. Plans to move the Overdose Prevention Site started as it has reached its capacity in its current location. EPIC, the CAT, Housing First 4 Youth and all of the Housing coalition and committees are working hard. Our Cowichan hosted its Network meeting.

<u>April</u> Our Cowichan efforts moved outside of the Cowichan Region as we supported the hosting of an Island wide Network gathering. The two days included opportunities for facilitators to learn from each other and then leadership from all networks to come together for a collective day of learning. The value of learning with others who engage in the same work is invaluable in our efforts to build healthier communities.

Our focus at home continued on with Opioid dialogues this time in Lake Cowichan. The evening was so successful that Naloxone training took place in the parking lot long after the session was over! Community sessions on housing were taking place across the region as we supported the CVRD and

Cowichan Housing Association in their efforts to learn from community and inform them of housing needs.

<u>May</u> Housing meetings were still ongoing and getting a little rough as some members of the public banded together to push back on community efforts for affordable housing. Community partners rallied together to support each other as times got rough.

The Overdose Prevention Site moved to its new location on Trunk Road and a community meeting to listen, learn and work with neighbouring businesses was held. Again, community partners helped each other get through difficult dialogues. Our Cowichan hosted its Network meeting

<u>June</u> Office time resulted in writing and supporting the writing of two successful Island Health Grants that brought funding to Nourish Cowichan to support early childhood lunch programs (\$12,500.00) and another to provide Neighbourhood Wellness events for seniors (\$25,000.00). It was also the time to submit the Overdose Prevention Grant of \$100,000.00.

In the community EPIC the CAT (Community Action Team) South Cowichan Seniors Network, Cowichan 2050, Child apprehension dialogues and more were underway

July What used to be the quiet month was no longer true! We brought together our members at Our Cowichan in dialogue with Island Health Executive on health and wellbeing in our region. It was also a time



when the long-awaited news about proceeding to plan for the new Cowichan



District Hospital was announced. July was also the time of two significant community undertakings the BC Summer Games and the Cowichan Elders Gathering. These two events are most noted for the astounding community contributions of time, resources and efforts. Thousands of



volunteers who wore the neon t shirts should be proud of representing Cowichan in the best possible way.

<u>August-</u> We rested! Your facilitator worked quietly from the office and co chair extraordinaire, Denise took over the emails during vacation time.

September came with a vengeance and we were off and running again. All committees were back in action. Our Cowichan Small Grants RFP's opened. Our Cowichan planned and prepared for a very special presentation with the Island Health Board of Directors and Executive. Housing conversations, meetings and planning were also in progress as the CVRD voted to go to referendum to implement a Housing Service via Cowichan Housing Association. The City of Duncan once again denies



community efforts to build a cold women's shelter for the 2018 winter. We had much work to do! Our Cowichan Health Network met.

October- The small grants team had their work cut out for



them in reviewing 2018 applications. At the end of the day recommendations for \$20,200.00 in grants were awarded! October brought together over 100 community partners, agencies and community members in our Opioid Symposium. The outcome of the day



will assist the development of a framework for response for our region. In addition to all that we learned we also developed new partnerships and

relationships to help us move forward. October was election month and over 10 months of incredibly hard work from so many community partners was rewarded as the referendum for a housing service was passed! This was a significant undertaking considering that at this time in 2016 housing was just surfacing as collaborative effort in our region. In addition to the symposium and election the community was active in all committee work relating to seniors, child apprehensions, physical literacy, the new hospital, Primary Care Networks, housing and homelessness work!



November Was a time to celebrate our 2017 small grant recipients as we were inspired by what they were able to accomplish with Our Cowichan small



grants! Dialogues around the region were underway

regarding the new Cowichan District Hospital and Health and Care Planning. Grants for further dialogues for Opioids and for youth alcohol were submitted in hopes we can continue to work with

community members on addressing substance use. As always, the committees continue to come together, collaborate and work for a better Cowichan.

December- and the day came! After a year of attempts on behalf of amazing dedicated community



organizations the Municipality of North Cowichan unanimously endorsed the permit for a women's cold weather shelter on the Cowichan University Village property. Immediately community partners who

supported Cowichan Women Against Violence

came together to

prepare for its opening. Generosity and kindness have humbled the community in its efforts and the impact of negative social media fade away as donations, offers of resources and support come pouring in. The shelter opened to no power and candlelight December 20!
















News Flash!
