

Local Data and or Research- Provincial Health Officer Releases Annual Report



Last week BC's provincial heath officer (PHO), released the report, <u>Taking the</u> <u>Pulse of the Population: An Update on the Health of British Columbians</u>. One of the four areas highlighted for more attention is early childhood development. The report recommends that government increase support for programs and policies that focus on health among women (including pregnant and postpartum women), children, youth and families. The report notes that in all health authorities "children are becoming increasingly vulnerable in terms of their social development." and "that the trend is moving away from the *A*_target..."

A quick look at Appendix C (pages 268-270), which offers a summary of the data measures used in the report, shows worrying trends in infant mortality, low birth weight, and growing inequities in life expectancy, among other concerns.

Opioid crisis a health issue, not a moral issue

In an interview with *CBC News*, BC's Minister of Mental Health and Addictions Judy Darcy <u>says the</u> <u>ongoing opioid crisis is a health issue, not a moral issue and needs to be treated as such by the</u> <u>province</u>.

+ Minister Darcy: "<u>We really need to integrate addiction treatment into our entire health care system,</u> <u>meaning every doctor's office</u>. This needs to become a daily part of what we deliver in health care."

\$10-a-day childcare changing peoples' lives

Childcare costs are a major chunk of the budget for most families with children, but a BC's new childcare pilot project has been a gift for some who now pay just \$10 a day. A special report by *The Star* <u>explores how it's already changed the lives of some lucky BC families—parents say</u> they're less stressed, eating healthier, and slowly climbing out of debt.

Meanwhile, a new report by the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives says <u>Vancouver remains</u> <u>among the most expensive cities in Canada when it comes to childcare but admits that recent</u> <u>policies are taking steps in the right direction</u>. And although childcare fees have been rising faster than inflation, the number of provinces now turning to set fee policies has also doubled.
