Evaluation Workshop

If you are like me, the word evaluation fills me with dread. The feeling that my work is being judged, often by people who are technocrats and who might not always understand or care about the work I do, is usually my first instinct. Not anymore – Liz Weaver and Mark Cabaj have taught me that evaluation can make the work of community change more effective and at times easier. The key is knowing enough about evaluation to gain better control of the value and purpose of evaluation.

We are excited to share with you that our most popular workshop, <u>Evaluating Community Impact</u>, is coming to Hamilton, Ontario, Canada on November 15-17 and registration officially opens today. Do you manage programs that need to be evaluated? Are you part of a collaborative that is trying to understand how to evaluate your work? Raise the Rates' Annual Welfare Food Challenge starts on World Food Day on Sunday, October 16, 2016, and runs for one week. During that week, participants eat only what they can purchase for \$18. Why \$18?

<u>Join</u> the over 600 people who have taken the challenge so far! In 2016 Raise the Rates aims to make it the biggest challenge ever and make poverty an election issue in 2017.

The challenge highlights the inadequacy of welfare rates in BC. A single person receives only \$610 a month, frozen for over nine years. Raise the Rates, with others, is working to raise public awareness of the extreme poverty of people on welfare and how this poverty costs the people of BC in human suffering and billions of wasted dollars every year.
